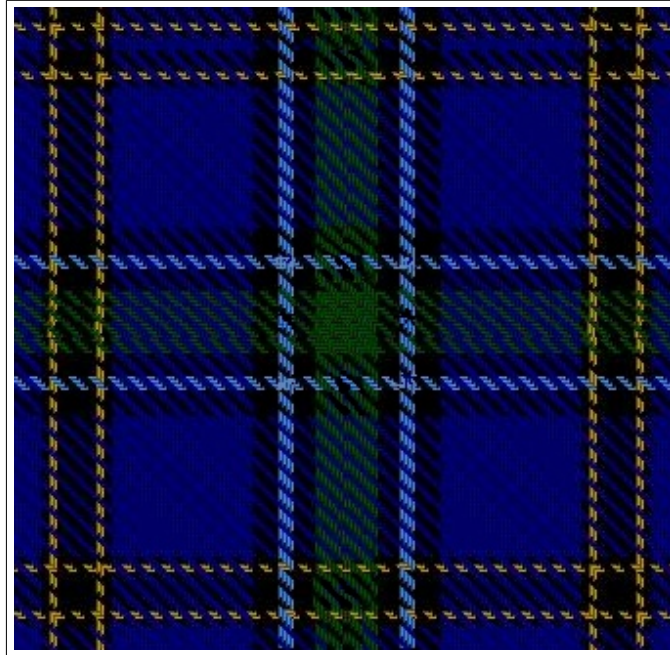


The Wier of Wierholm Tartan

Tartans are fabric designs with repeating bands of color. Usually the pattern is symmetrical about a center point, both horizontally and vertically. One repeat is called a sett. Traditionally tartan cloth is woven in wool twill, though sometimes plain weave is used.

The Wier tartan was designed by Stuart Wier in January 2018 for the use of his family. Others are welcome to use it. There is no other Wier tartan. Wierholm is an informal name for the home of this branch of Wiers.



The threadcount for this tartan, from the green pivot point in the center of a sett, is G8 K6 LB4 K6 RB36 K2 MY2 K5. The threadcount is used by weavers to precisely specify a design. The color pallet used is G=004C00 dark green, K=000000 black, LB=3C8CF light blue, RB=00008C royal blue, and MY=C89800 medium yellow. Note that this is not one of the several “Weir” tartans.

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This tartan is not registered with the Scottish Tartans Society, the Scottish Tartans Authority, the Scottish Tartans World Register, or the Scottish Register of Tartans, but it is a tartan. Tartans are simply fabric designs. There are “clan tartans” but most tartans are not. Anyone can create a tartan.

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
